



STATE OF THE CITY ADDRESS

Dear Citizens:

There is an often quoted line that has never been more applicable than it is today:



“The great thing in this world is not so much where you stand, as in what direction you are moving.”

Whatever your economic status, political leanings, or path that you choose to take in life, you must admit to yourself that the right moves bring about the most desired outcomes. As your leader of our great City, I want to ensure you that the City of Green River is moving in the right direction.

I must first acknowledge the dedication of my fellow City Council Members who continue to move our City forward during these tough economic times. In the last quarter of 2010 your vote prompted a change in our Governing Body, where we now have a mixed council of new and tenured officials that are bringing about new ideas and have begun to collaborate on making key, sound decisions for your City. This is a change in the right direction.

We are ever so grateful to live in a City with a low crime rate. Our Green River Police Officers continue to maintain our low crime rate with proactive 24/7 patrol, aggressive investigation of reported crimes and active participation in the Southwest Drug Enforcement Team. In 2010, we continued our investment in your safety by adding a new Special Response Team Command/Transport vehicle to our Police fleet. This vehicle will not only be used to store special equipment and transport officers to a scene, but will also serve as a temporary command facility for critical incidents. Going forward, all of our officers, public safety dispatchers and Animal Control officers will continue to receive advanced training in aspects of law enforcement that will allow them diversification and enhance the combined resources of our Police department. This is all moving in the right direction.



I commend our volunteer firefighters for their dedicated service and for putting their lives on the line to protect our lives and property. In 2010 the Fire Department continued to do preventative hands-on training with portable dry chemical fire extinguishers. They presented fire prevention programs throughout the City, touching over 13,000 lives. Through the fire prevention and fire education programs, the City was able to see a 20 percent decrease from 2009 in total Green River fire-related incidents. This is positive change in the right direction.



The continued maintenance of our infrastructure – our roads, our water and sewer system, and our buildings, are vital to the future growth and development of our wonderful City. In 2010, our Public Works department finished projects that were made possible by you, our taxpayers and voters, who supported the capital facilities tax, better known as the 6th Penny tax.

I am proud of the fact that Green River is living by its name to be green. In 2010 the first ever Green River “America Recycles Day” event was conducted, a business cardboard recycling program was implemented (eventually saved area businesses over \$20,000), the Annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection event was again a success and the expansion of the Recycling Center to include an additional drop-off site was completed. Looking forward, Public Works foresees an expanded recycling program that will create new partnerships, promote recovery and recycling through collaboration of entities, and educate and promote the benefits of reusing, reducing, and recycling. This is a change in the right direction.

In 2010 positive change was visibly seen in our Department of Community Development, who embraced several community events. The City’s new URA/Mainstreet Manager wasted little time in implementing and distributing a monthly Main Street newsletter which led to the formation of a Main Street Business Directory.

The Community Development department also took on the responsibility of enforcing the nuisance ordinance by having the Senior Building Inspector authorized to issue nuisance citations. The benefit from this is a City that remains visibly neat and clean. The focus of this department continues to be on the future Green River: an attractive, well-planned City with an active downtown and riverfront. This is change in the right direction.



To say that our Parks & Recreation Department went above and beyond in 2010 would be an understatement. Not only do they continue to bring you recreational opportunities through people, parks, and programs, but they continue to win awards for their unprecedented achievements. By earning the National Playful City USA award for the third consecutive year, being named a Tree City USA recipient for the 27th year, and receiving the 2010 Wyoming Association of Municipalities Community Hero Award, this department consistently moves in the right direction and displays positive outcomes.

Our Municipal Court continues to adjudicate all criminal violations of Ordinances in or of the City of Green River. In order to gain positive outcomes from all criminal violation cases, the Court has instituted various programs, such as the Plea Agreement Regarding Speed program and the Stoplifting.com program, which are both designed to change a person's perspective on their particular violation.

Without our Human Resources Department continuously hiring and retaining a top-notch quality staff, we wouldn't be able to effectively bring you the City services you currently receive. Our HR department will continue to attract a workforce that will positively serve you and your community.



The Finance Department supports your City internally and is our backbone for financial success. This department includes Accounting, Information Technology, and Purchasing, supporting much of the daily activity within the City. I thank them all for working behind the scenes to make sure that your City runs smoothly and effortlessly.

As I begin my second term as your Mayor, I look toward to the future with you in mind. Even as the Governor's proposed budget will reduce revenue and undoubtedly have an impact on the delivery and quality of services in our City, know that you are in good hands and that your City is financially sound.

This national recession has taught all of us a valuable lesson on being financially responsible, and has also given us an opportunity to re-evaluate and prioritize what is most important for your community. The most important things are not always what you want, but what you need.



With a new year already underway, the City Council and I, your Mayor, will work hard and long to move this City in the right direction with consistent and sound decisions. These decisions will not be easy, but I know that working as a group of seven with a voice of one will allow us to debate the issues, work together where we can, and work on areas where we don't seem to work together! The Governing Body meets to conduct official City business the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 7:00 p.m. in City Hall Council Chambers. They also meet the second Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. for “workshop” issues with no official action taken.

Citizens elect us to staggered four-year terms. There is no limit to the number of terms a Council Member can serve. Council Members also serve on standing committees appointed by the Mayor.

The Council's major functions and duties are primarily legislative. Council directs City affairs by passing ordinances or adopting resolutions. Either may be introduced by a Council Member at a business meeting, but ideas for them also may originate from citizens or City staff.

The Mayor of Green River is the chief elected official of the City with all the powers and duties of a Council Member.

The Mayor appoints Council Members to inter-agency committees and citizen volunteers to City advisory boards and commissions with Council approval. He signs all ordinances and bonds authorized by the Council. Each year the Council elects one of its members as Council President to serve temporarily in the Mayor's absence.

Dear Citizens:

For those of us working in local government, Yogi Berra’s statement certainly holds meaning today. Cities and towns in Wyoming are called upon to reshape their organizations to satisfy public expectations by maintaining or even increasing services in a declining revenue environment.

In today’s world, the emphasis of individualism over collective responsibility is leading citizens to view local government as a personal supplier of services. We reinforce this attitude when residents of a community are seen as customers. People see their government as a vending machine, receiving and paying only for what is individually needed and received. This

puts elected officials in the place of attempting to fulfill the demands of “all customers.”

But, in trying to fulfill the demands of customers in a declining revenue environment, elected officials must determine which expenditures are inappropriate or excessive. Is it money spent on law enforcement or recreation? Is it money spent on street maintenance or sanitation?

Deciding we are spending too much only starts a process. Without a guiding sense of the purpose of city government, cuts are made by political pressure and not a sense of purpose. When we take taxpayers’ revenues and spend it to advance the fulfillment of our “collective purpose,” it looks like prudent leadership. When we take revenues and spend it where voices are loudest or our personal passions are strongest, it looks like pigs at the trough.

“The future ain’t what it used to be.” Making cuts that can be defended, and defending them in terms of the core purpose of the City may not satisfy the crowd, but it will reach those who are concerned about the future of our City.

The City of Green River must stay focused and continue to seek to become a great community, not just a good one. We must know what we are here for, and our decisions and actions must always be grounded in that knowledge. Otherwise, our City will wander between poles of competing interests or strong passions, rather than steering a straight and true course of meeting the needs of the people.

I am convinced this community will continue to accomplish many great things as we carry out our mission. Greatness is a process, not an end point.

Investigations

- In 2010, Investigations had a total of 59 felony drug cases and 90 felony arrests
- A total street value of \$1,845,239 in drugs was seized
- The discovery and seizure of two vehicles, \$52,235 dollars cash and 16 firearms were made
- A detective that trained in computer forensics and ICAC (Internet Crimes against Children) worked three cases that were prosecuted in Federal Court totaling 30 years of imprisonment

Patrol

- Maintained low crime rates in 2010 with proactive twenty-four seven patrol
- Implemented the mobile data terminal project and phase one of the wireless project in collaboration with the Information Technology division
- A total of 14, 412 calls for service were answered

Animal Control

- Educated over 80 children in classrooms on pet safety and responsibility
- Initiated use of Petfinder.com to successfully increase animal adoptions
- Participated in Safety Days 2010
- Over 650 animals were adopted to new homes, returned to their current residences, or relocated to other areas



Awards & Accomplishments

- Police Chief John Love received the 2010 DARE Administrator of the Year Award from the Wyoming DARE Officers Association
- Green River Special Response Team was presented with the Grateful Appreciation Award from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office for their outstanding support and assistance with an officer involved shooting
- Animal Control was awarded the Red Carpet Award by the Green River Chamber of Commerce
- Several staff members received training as Drug Recognition Experts and have used the trainings in schools and on the streets
- Crime in the schools has continued to decrease due to the combined efforts of the school district administration, individual school administration and school resource officers

- Fire prevention programs were given to local elementary schools as well as residents living in Mansface Terrance and Green Rock Village



Training: By the Numbers

- 13 firefighters received over 200 Training hours and 4 firefighters received over 300 Training hours
- 15 hazardous material trainings were done
- 72 fire prevention sessions were done
- A combined total of 6,521 hours of training were documented

Green River Recreation Center

The Green River Recreation Center is managed through the Parks & Recreation Department. There were over 93,000 visitors to the Center during 2010. The Recreation Center has excellent amenities including a swimming pool, hot tub, sauna, steam room,



gymnasium, racquetball courts, cardio equipment, fitness room, a half mile outdoor walking path, meeting rooms, nursery and much more. Some of the Health & Fitness classes that are offered are: 50 & 100 Fitness Class Club, 100, 500 & 1000 Mile Club, Bench Stepping, Circuit Training, Deep and Shallow Water Aerobics, Kickboxing, Powers ABS, Powerhouse, Pump N' Flex, Rusty Hinges, Senior Strength Training Clinics, Silver Sneakers Fitness Program, Spinning, Weight Training Clinics, Swimming Lessons, Yoga and Zumba. The Recreation Center also offers a Personal Trainer Program.

Keeping You on the Move

- Completed the construction of the 6th Penny Street & Capital Improvement Projects
 - Completed the construction of the 2010 Crossbow Utility Project
 - 17 streets were crack sealed in 2010 along with other road maintenance such as pothole patching, street sweeping and sign maintenance
 - Maintained 13 miles of drainage ditches, approximately 6 miles of storm water lines, 520 catch basins, and 2 pump stations in the City
 - Collected and transported solid waste generated by the City residents and businesses
- Performed a total number of 3,284 service and repairs to the entire City fleet of vehicles and equipment to provide a cost effective service in keeping City employees on the move which in turn kept the community on the move

Becoming Green

- The Recycling expansion included an additional drop off site and many new materials added
- The first Green River "America Recycles Day" event on November 16th was successful with 42 participants throughout the day
- Through the business cardboard recycling program in 2010 savings to area businesses was \$20,544
- Conducted the annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection that was successful in collecting many hazardous wastes materials from area residents; In 2010 the event included a new Prescription Drug station
- The team helped out with various activities such as the Adopt-A-Highway program, Overland Stage Stampede Rodeo, Flaming Gorge Days, and the Powell Plunge, Art on the Green, City Wide Clean Up and many other City functions throughout 2010
- 22,297 tons of waste and 4,475 tons of concrete were taken at the City Landfill
- The Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan (ISWMP) was completed and approved in June
- Direction to close the landfill and begin transferring the City garbage to a regional Landfill when the existing permitted 40 acres is completely full was implemented

Main Street Program

- Organized and held 3rd Annual Farmer's Market and the 3rd Annual Trunk or Treat event.
- Participated in many community events including: 5th Annual Liberty Day Event, Crystal Classic, Kiwanis Club Safety Day, City Wide Clean-Up Day, Flaming Gorge Days, Mayor's Christmas Tree Lighting and Chamber of Commerce Santa's Arrival and Lighted Kiddie Parade
- Began preparing and distributing monthly Main Street Newsletters and began the implementation of a Main Street Business Directory
- Collected 1,941 cards for the Holiday Cards for Heroes Red Cross program
- Completed a best use study for the historic church on Flaming Gorge Way



Urban Renewal Agency

- Completed the Marketing, Design and Branding Study (including new City Logo).
- Worked on the rehabilitation of the Historic Viaduct over the Union Pacific rail yard.

Planning

- Continued work on updating the City of Green River Comprehensive Plan, Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance.
- Amended the Zoning Ordinance to add overlay districts to the Zoning Map that incorporate the old Urban Renewal Design Guidelines into the Zoning Ordinance

Building Division

- The Building Division has taken on the responsibility of nuisance ordinance enforcement which is easily tied into the adopted 2006 International Property Maintenance Code. To assist with the enforcement, the Senior Building Inspector became authorized to issue citations.
- Continued work on review and amendments to permitting and inspection procedures to streamline processes and provide better customer service.

Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Division

- Processed 300+ map requests, 9 applications for the 50/50 sidewalk replacement program, and managed/processed 34 excavation permits in 2010.
- Research and mapping of City Land Records and Easements

The Municipal Court is presided over by Judge Jason Petri. The Municipal Court Judge has exclusive jurisdiction over all criminal violations of ordinances of the City of Green River. Fines do not exceed \$750 for any one offense and imprisonment does not exceed six months.

Municipal Court Available Programs

- Defensive Driving School - The Municipal Court is offering Street Rules Online, an online defensive driving class
- Teen Court - Teen Court is an alternative sentencing program for teenagers between the ages of 13 and 17 who are charged with a first offense
- Alive at 25 - A National Law Enforcement Curriculum provided by the Wyoming Highway Patrol for drivers between the ages of 16 and 24
- Plea Agreement Regarding Speed - For first time offenders and offered to both juveniles and adults
- STOPLifting.com - An online education course designed specifically for shoplifters

Department Accomplishments

- Retention and maintenance of approximately 3,000 records within the City's vault, which includes contracts, capital projects, grants, and the history of City land
- Verification of contracts and agreements
- The Information Technology division completed Phase 1 of the Wireless Project
- Prepared bid documents, including advertising, and held bid openings for 17 bids
- Maintained general office and janitorial supplies inventory
- Processed payrolls for over 250 employees and volunteer firefighters
- Approximately 2,100 miles were walked reading meters 56,000 times
- Approximately 57,000 utility bills were processed, 5,300 calls were answered, 11,000 invoices were made, and 450 payments were arranged
- Approximately 47,000 payments were processed with 28,000 by mail and 19,000 by walk-in customers



\$15,946,113


WHERE DO CITY DOLLARS COME FROM?

Budgeted Revenue




WHERE DO CITY DOLLARS GO?




Fish it, Float it, Live it — That is the heart of what will continue to make the City of Green River forever alive, vibrant, and optimistic.
